

**Congregational Vitality Pathways Initiative:** For

those unfamiliar with the Wards Chapel Vitality Pathways initiative, or just need a reminder, we were invited by our Conference to participate in this 12-month process of discovery, exploration, and renewal. This initiative is designed to further understand our church and surrounding community and ignite our own faith into action. Our end goal, and the result of our action, is to cultivate discipleship more deeply and intentionally throughout our community.

Thus far, our team of five has completed two of the required six study modules in our Vitality Pathways course work. The first module focused on learning as much as we can about our community, first producing very detailed demographic reports describing our surrounding populace. This work is subsequently supplemented by the personal touch of reaching out to church members and those in our community in "Relational 1-1s" to gauge their feelings, views, concerns, and motivating interests, as well as discerning their viewpoints on religion in general and Wards Chapel in particular. We have spoken to some church members in this regard, and also reached out to individuals coming to our Food Pantry. Additionally, we have touched base with some pre-school parents.

Our second module's emphasis was on empathy, a vital tool for establishing deep and lasting connections with those whom we contact in our work. It calls for understanding what people are seeing, saying, feeling, and doing, touching on worship preferences, hospitality preferences, and outreach preferences as well.

Please note that a more detailed update on the progress and plans of the Vitality Pathways team will be provided as either part of, or a follow-on to a Wards Chapel church service during November.

## Bishop's Message

Bishop LaTrelle Miller Easterling

Episcopal servant, Peninsula-Delaware & Baltimore-Washington Conferences

Beloved of God,

I greet you in the name of our Savior, Jesus, who lived, died, and is resurrected for the sake of reconciliation and peace. On Oct. 7, as many Jews had just observed the Jewish festival of Sukkot, Hamas launched thousands of rockets into Israel, killing more than 900 individuals and injuring thousands more. The carnage was exacerbated as individuals were taken hostage, brutally attacked and terrorized. This reprehensible act was wrought by air, land, and sea, harming many innocent civilians, including women and children. In response to this violence, Israel declared war against Hamas.

The world rose to condemn these heinous acts, as it should. There simply is no justification for such loss of life.

And the full truth requires an acknowledgment of the multi-faceted issues and longstanding conflicts in this region. The conflict is deeply rooted in a complex web of historical, political, social, and territorial issues. There has been aggression, violence, and bloodshed at the hands of both Israel and Palestine. Both claim rightful ownership of common land. Multiple administrations have worked tirelessly for a twostate solution, one Israeli and one Palestinian, with neither side being willing to compromise to bring this plan to fruition. That unwillingness has cost countless lives and frustrated efforts for peace since World War I. As the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., very aptly stated, "It is not enough to say we must not wage war. It is necessary to love peace and sacrifice for it."

We all weep with the families who have lost loved ones, both Israeli and Palestinian, and we pray for peace.

And we must weep for those around the world who are also living through war, prolonged violence, and terrorism. There are myriad armed conflicts in the world right now. According to Global Citizen, over 2 billion people currently reside in conflict-affected areas. I lament that we seem to call attention to pain in some parts of our world while ignoring the suffering and devastation in other parts. While God detests violence anywhere, God holds all life sacred everywhere.

There is not a single mainstream religious tradition founded upon the notion of hate, domination, or hierarchies of human worth. All those who believe in peace and the right for every human being to reach their highest potential must work together for an end to violence of any kind. The World Council of Churches invites all religious communities to embrace an embodied ecumenism that will "never seek to divide or conquer, to exploit or humiliate, to overwhelm by violence or enforce unity, nor to collude anymore with the inequalities of the world." I join them in rejecting politics shaped by deepened individualism, dangerous nationalism or increasing militarism.

The United Methodist Book of Resolutions is clear on this subject. It states, "Peace is not simply the absence of war. ... It is that emerging dynamic reality envisioned by prophets where spears and swords give way to implements of peace; where historic antagonists dwell together in trust; and where righteousness and justice prevail. As the children of God, we believe this prophetic vision is not just a dream or a passive prayer; rather, it is our calling. We are called to acts of mercy, peace and justice.

As Mother Teresa stated, "If we have no peace, it is because we have forgotten that we belong to each other." May we remember our common bond, common calling, and common Creator and may we be willing to sacrifice for peace.



# Wards Chapel UMC Operating Fund Year to Year Comparison as of Sept 2023

#### YTD Financial Summary:

Offering and other gifts are trending as planned. The negative cash balance will continue until December when we should receive "Other Donations".

Pastoral/Staff/Office variance is the result of 5% salary increases, increased staff salaries related to Choir starting back up in 2023 and an increase in office expense. The office expense increase should just be a timing issue.

Overall expenses are trending as expected with the exception of the \$4,523 amount related to prior years services performed but not billed until 2023.

Comparative Analysis Adjustment - The \$4,523 was expensed in 2023 but the services were performed from 2017-2021. This amount is excluded for year over year analysis only. The \$6,565 represents one additional month of salary paid early for tax purposes. It is excluded for year over year analysis only.
