Alzheimer's Report: I'm excited to share the following information that was presented to the Alzheimer's committee that I volunteer on-

The international conference on Alzheimer's brought together over 7000 in person attendees and over 3000 on line this July to discuss new findings. In the US, Leqembi is the first traditionally approved FDA drug that changes the

underlying course of Alzheimer's disease. It works by targeting amyloid beta and is administered twice monthly through intravenous infusing. Clinical trials clearly demonstrate that removing amyloid from the brain provides measurable, meaningful benefit in the people with early Alzheimer's. The CMS (Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services) will cover the cost if the patient's physician enrolls them in CMS run registry.

This is a huge step forward for those who are just beginning to have memory issues. Being identified early makes a difference and now the drug cost will be covered by Medicare or or Medicaid so all levels of income will have access to this treatment. ~Carol Parker

Wards Chapel UMC Operating Fund Year to Year Comparison as of July 2023

YTD Financial Summary:

Offering is trending slightly lower then prior year at this point but it appears to be a timing issue. This figure will be closely monitored.

Pastoral/Staff/Office variance is the result of 5% salary increases, increased staff salaries related to Choir starting back up in 2023 and an increase in office expense. The office expense increase should just be a timing issue.

Overall expenses are trending as expected with the exception of the \$4,523 amount related to prior years services performed but not billed until 2023.

Comparative Analysis Adjustment - The \$4,523 was expensed in 2023 but the services were performed from 2017-2021. This amount is excluded for year over year analysis only. The \$6,565 represents one additional month of salary paid early for tax purposes. It is excluded for year over year analysis only.

The Martin Family Legacy to Wards Chapel UMC

William W. ("Bill") Martin died on December 18, 2022, in his home on Liberty Road in Harrisonville where he was born and lived his entire life. His death ended three generations of an extraordinary family and begins an extraordinary legacy to Wards Chapel United Methodist Church.

Dr. William E. Martin (Wm. W. Martin's grandfather) was born in 1881 in Reisterstown. He became a storekeeper for Springfield State Hospital in Sykesville, and in his off-hours attended University of Maryland Medical School. Upon graduation in 1908, the young doctor and his wife, the former Hannah Bailey, of Easton, moved to Harrisonville on Liberty Road.

His practice began with a horse and buggy, a sleigh in winter, and a Ford roadster. He often had to use a horse or mule to reach remote patients' homes. Over his 60-year career he delivered 4,000 babies, mostly in their homes. In his early years he charged 50 cents for office visits, and \$10 for a baby delivery.

He proposed the first health center in the Randallstown area, was its health officer, and was an assistant State Medical Examiner. For most of his career he was the sole doctor in the Randallstown and Sykesville areas.

He was a member of the Lions Club of Randallstown, the Liberty Road Volunteer Fire Company, a postmaster of Freedom Lodge No. 112, vice-president of the Board of Directors of the Randallstown Bank, and member of the Board of Directors of Maryland National Bank.

Dr. William E. Martin died in 1974, and was survived by his son, William B. Martin. In his estate, he established the William E. Martin Trust for his family. His Trust provided that upon the passing of his two grandsons, Lynn and Bill (William W. Martin) that the balance of the Trust, now approximately \$1,100,000 would be turned over to Ward's Chapel United Methodist Church.

Dr. Martin's son, William B. Martin, and his wife, Elizabeth lived their entire life in the same home with Dr. and Hannah Martin, purchased in 1921. William B. Martin became a noted banker and managed the Randallstown and Woodmoor branches of Maryland National Bank. William B. Martin and Elizabeth enjoyed travelling and spending time on their cabin cruiser on the Chesapeake Bay. William B. Martin died in 2002.

Like his father, William B. Martin established a trust for his two sons, Lynn and Bill (William W. Martin). This Trust terminated upon the passing of Lynn and Bill, and according to its terms, bequeathed the entire balance to Ward's Chapel United Methodist Church, approximately \$2,500,000.

William B. and Elizabeth had two sons, Lynn, and Bill (William W. Martin). Both Lynn and Bill lived their entire lives in the family home on Liberty Road. Neither Bill nor Lynn ever married. Lynn, a large loveable man, standing six feet three, spent his life in the Ward's Chapel community, helping at various businesses, and being a loyal member of the Liberty Road Fire Company. Lynn also enjoyed maintaining the family home, following NASCAR and Orioles baseball. Lynn passed away in 2019.

William W. Martin was born in 1932. He spent his entire working career in the Maryland Forest Service, as a forest ranger. He loved nature and trees. Bill enjoyed travelling, particularly to national parks throughout the United States. He also enjoyed following the Colts, Ravens and Orioles and was a lifetime member of the Liberty Road Fire Company, where he served on its ambulance service for many years. As his father and grandfather, Bill was very generous, and left his entire estate to Carroll Hospital and to the Ward's Chapel Heritage Fund. The Heritage Fund bequest is approximately \$1,000,000 and will be added to the existing Heritage Fund balance.

Ward's Chapel is extremely surprised and grateful for this legacy from the Martin family. The Church Council has decided that the William E. Martin bequest (\$1,100,000) will be maintained as a separate fund within the church. The goal of this fund is to preserve the principle while maximizing income generation. All income generated from this fund will be used for Church-sponsored good works (estimated at \$45,000 per year). Good works will be defined as outreach, missions or other activities sponsored by the Church to spread God's word.

The Church Council has decided that the bequest from William B. Martin (\$2,500,000) will also be maintained as a separate fund within the church. This fund will also be managed by preserving the principal and only using the generated income for church related improvements or enhancements. These activities could include major repairs, improvements to existing infrastructure or enhanced and expanded church activities and programs that cannot be supported financially by the current Operating Fund.
